One reason why Russia struggled in WW1 was because of her resources. For example, Russia had less than half of the resources that Britain had, which meant that good quality weapons and ammunition were scarce. This meant that many of the soldiers were poorly equipped, which led to high casualties. Another reason was the size of the Russian army. It was much larger than the German army, but it was not well trained and suffered from a lack of leadership. This led to the army being ineffective in battle. Finally, the Russian economy was in a state of collapse, which meant that the soldiers were not properly fed and sheltered. This led to a lack of morale and a willingness to desert. Overall, these factors combined to make Russia a weak power in WW1.

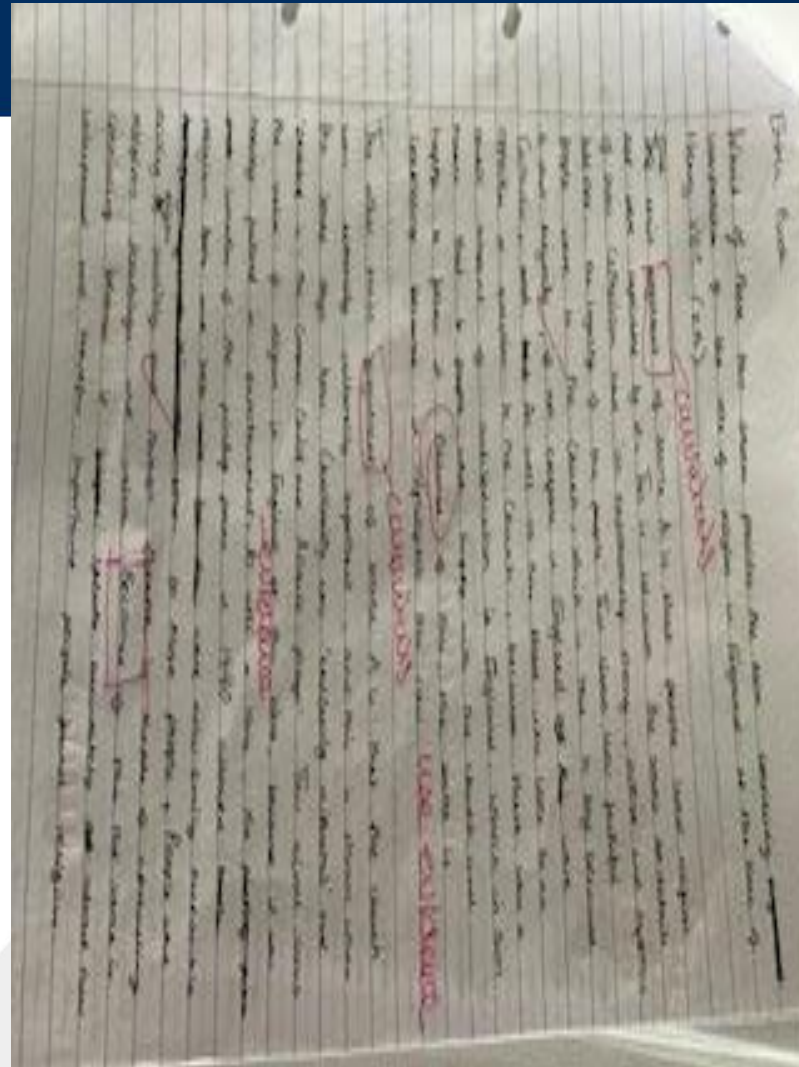
