What a fantastic first week back it has been! It has been brilliant to see the school operating in a 'pre Covid' fashion with more movement around the school, grouped tables, mixed sets and not a bubble in sight.

Our children who are new to school in FS2 have settled in really well over the week and have had so much fun playing outside, painting and learning their phonics. We have also introduced a fair few new children into other year groups and it has been a pleasure to see how our Penshurst community has embraced them and helped them to adjust to a new school.

We also have three new teachers with us this year: Miss Robinson (Nursery), Miss Wray (Year 1) and Miss Dunwell (Year 6). They have all settled in already and are really keen to meet all the parents and become involved in all of our community events.

Once again we have been thwarted by the weather and have had to postpone Sports Day - it really does seem we are destined no to do this event! However, we will try and put in another date and let you know in good time. We will endeavour to still hold the FS2 Sports Day on Friday 17th at 9:15am (weather permitting) as we are aware that they missed their very first School Sports Day due to Lockdowns.

Over the summer, the school has been an extremely busy place with a new roof fitted over the Nursery and Dining Hall, new teaching areas created in FS2 via bi-fold doors and a full top to toe decoration of the main hall and the front office. Over the next week, we are also starting our work on the KS1 playground where lots of markings, a brand new mural and new play equipment will be found. This is something we have been wanting to do for a long time and we will be very excited to show the children their new play area.

In addition to all of this, we have a brand new catering company onboard (ABM) and they have already impressed us with their healthy food. The food looks delicious and many pupils have commented on the quality and quantity of the meals.

We are now forward planning for the year to squeeze in as many trips, visits, experiences and visitors to school. These will include Young Voices, Y6 residential, Cinema Trips, Bridlington, Hornsea, The Deep, Hull Maritime, Ferensway Gallery, Swimming, Bikeabilty plus all the normal favourites such as P Factor, Christmas Shows, Disco's and Film Nights. WEEK 2 - Friday 17 September 2021

Thank you for your continued cooperation with the 'Safer Streets' scheme on the Winthorpe Road side of school. It has certainly created a much calmer and safer environment for walkers on these roads. Please remember if you are a permit holder, to display your permit in your windscreen not leave it lying on your dashboard as the marshals can see it instantly and allow you through quickly.

This week we have been holding a number of sessions with the children and 'Relax Kids'. This organisation focuses on the mental health and well being of children and how adults can support them. This organisation believes that *"Learning about emotions and emotional skills is as important as learning core subjects as no matter what children do in life, their emotions will follow them" – Marneta Viegas, founder of Relax Kids.*

We have also had staff meetings with the organisation to help staff learn more about how we can support children effectively in school.

It has been amazing to see how well the children have slipped back into school life and every class I visit is calm and purposeful with children working really hard. The books that we purchased last year are being put to good use in Reading lessons with all children now having their own copy of the lead text. It is an absolute pleasure to walk around the school at 1pm (when we hold our 'Pledge' time) and see every child with their head in a book engrossed in their reading.

We are currently holding a review of our homework policy and will be trialling a few options over the Autumn term to ensure we make the right changes. We will be giving out spellings on Thursday on the Purple Mash site that you all have logins for. This site allows you to practice the spellings in a fun and interactive way. For those children who we know have issues with access to technology, we will provide a paper copy. Once we have introduced spellings, we will then offer Maths homework also on Purple Mash. Reading should be completed three times a week at home to ensure children become fluent. Our 'pledge' is that we will read at least 10 minutes extra, three times a week with the children to match your home reading. Fluency in reading is one of the best gifts you can give a child as everything we learn is dependent on being able to read well.

Finally, thank you for supporting our FS2 sports day. At least we have managed to get one event completed! Details of the Monster Pyjama party and Christmas events to follow in the coming weeks. Parents Evening will be virtual and will be held on 8 and 10 November booking details will be sent out to you in the coming weeks. We will aim to hold a more informal evening where you can look at books later in the year.

WEEK 3 - Friday 24 September 2021

I would like to start by saying thank you to everyone who enters school via Winthorpe Road. Due to work on the KS1 playground we have had to divert to the field to drop off and collect and it has all gone very smoothly. Fortunately the weather has been on our side this week and we have been able to use the field for lunch and playtimes, meaning we haven't missed the playground too much. I'm sure the pupils are really going to enjoy their new playground markings and equipment. In addition, thank you for your support with the Safer Streets initiative. I would like to point out that the school did not provide or have any input into the council signs and marketing which have incorrect spellings - we did point this out to them on Day 1!

I have spent most of the week checking in on the quality of teaching and learning in the classrooms and have seen some wonderful activities taking place. Year 6 has been grappling with fractions all week. On Monday a pupil told me she hated fractions, by Wednesday they weren't too bad and then on Friday fractions were actually kind of ok! This is good news as the SATs exams are full of fraction questions! Staying with Year 6, there is a meeting straight after school on **Tuesday 28 September** for parents to learn a little more about the Residential trip. If you could enter school via the school office entrance, a member of staff will escort you to the Year 6 classroom. It is worth noting that the residential is an optional trip.

The EYFS has had many national reforms which come into play from this academic year. The focus is much more on playing with the children than observing them while also ensuring the curriculum is ambitious enough to challenge those children ready for formal learning. To that end we have split the unit up into three distinct classrooms with new dividing doors to ensure that lesson time can be focused without any surrounding distractions. The children will still mix in choosing times but will remain in their own class for reading, writing and maths learning. Please make use of the online platform Tapestry to let us know about any specific interests your child has or any achievements as we will celebrate these in the class and adapt provisions to suit their interests.

The new library has had a very successful opening with lots of excited children clutching brand new shiny books. These are logged out as they would be in a public library so we can keep tabs on where the books are and make sure they return. Very occasionally a pupil make pick up a book of the wrong level (usually because the cover is exciting) and if this happens, please pop the book back and we will change it. We do encourage free readers to pick their own book. If you have any books your child has grown out of, we are always really grateful to accept them.

Lunchtimes are also very smooth now and it is a credit to the pupils that they have adapted so quickly to going to the hall for lunch and following all the procedures in place. The new catering company has been a hit with the bigger portions and a great choice of foods. We are working incredibly hard on using our manners in the dining hall, encouraging the children to say please and thank you to the servers and taking responsibility for clearing their plates and not making a mess in the hall. It is strange to think that for FS1/2, Y1 and Y2 pupils they have never accessed these communal parts of the day and I am so proud of the way they are coping with all of the changes in school this year.

While we are still maintaining a certain amount of caution regarding mass gatherings such as assemblies and events, we will begin to embark on the cycle of sports fixtures that are

slowly returning. I have to issue a word of warning to all those who will have their children on sports teams.... we don't get a great deal of notice from the schools association! Often we get given a couple of days' notice for a match or event. We will of course inform you as soon as we know but I am apologising already for any short notice!

Finally it is with sadness that we say a fond farewell to three members of staff who retire next week. Mrs Lewis, Mrs Kochar and Mrs Potter have worked at Penshurst for 105 years between them. They will be missed but we wish them all the best for a well-deserved retirement.

It has been another busy week at Penshurst with lots of visitors touring our school to look at our new reading schemes, provide support to individual children and to provide mental health lessons to our Year 5 and 6 children. It is lovely to have people back in the building again instead of having online sessions and great to have additional support for the well being of all of our pupils.

We are also lucky that we will be able to welcome university students back properly to train with us as we are passionate about inspiring and coaching the next generation of teachers. As they begin to join us in school, we will let you know who they are and which class they are helping with so you will recognise them out on playgrounds at pick up and collection times.

A few housekeeping reminders....

We have had some comments from parents about the inappropriate length of some of the skirts worn in school. As you all know we have a strict uniform policy across the 'through' school and we have already mentioned this issue via text, blog, email and individual phone calls. Teachers will be ringing when the uniform is deemed of inappropriate length or too tight as well as when hair is dyed or shaved.

The uniform policy states:

Hair should be of even length, no shaved patterns. Mohican styles are not permitted. Hair should be of a natural colour. Hair accessories should be of school colours (grey, white, green or black) and of an appropriate size

Please do not shoot the messenger, so to speak, as teachers have been asked to address these issues in accordance with the school policy. As many of you with siblings in the secondary phase will know, the rigour continues when they leave our site and transfer to the high school.

If you wish to discuss any uniform issues further, please contact a member of the senior leadership team.

Please ensure your child arrives at school with a coat as the weather is really turning and we will be unable to let them outside without a coat. It is certainly Hull Fair weather now but we like to get the children wrapped up and outside as much as possible.

Unfortunately I have also received a fair few complaints from local residents about parents parking over their drives so they cannot get out to work. Please drive carefully and be considerate to the local residents. I understand that parking is at a premium around the school area as most streets have cars already parked down them but it is important that we are respectful of those who live in the school area.

To end on a more cheerful note, let's talk about cake! We are now receiving homemade cakes and buns for birthdays. This is a tradition in every school I have ever worked in however with the increase in dietary needs and the healthy schools agenda, we no longer allow the children to eat the treats in school and instead send them home for parents to make the decision as to when and if your child can have it. It is always helpful as well for us to have a note stating the ingredients as we have so many dietary intolerances in school now.

We would never risk giving out any food product in class to these children if we are not sure about the ingredients.

If you are braving Hull Fair, be careful and have fun!

I will begin with a thank you to all of the parents we have spoken to regarding uniforms. The large majority of pupils are now dressed entirely appropriately and in line with our school policy. There still remain a couple of issues with leggings which need resolving (leggings are not appropriate for school) but we are really pleased with the cooperation from parents.

The main topic of conversation this week in our senior leadership meetings has been around social media. The internet is of course a marvellous tool and the many social media platforms are in the main used respectfully. However in the past few weeks we have seen a rise in inappropriate use of social media by our pupils outside school which we have been made aware of.

As a staff we follow the 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' guidance and it is our duty to follow up any misuse of social media that we are party to. The guidance states: *staff should be aware that technology is a significant component in many safeguarding and wellbeing issues. Children are at risk of abuse online as well as face to face. In many cases abuse will take place concurrently via online channels and in daily life. Children can also abuse their peers online, this can take the form of abusive, harassing, and misogynistic messages. We do record these incidents as cyber bullying and will contact parents of both the pupils who have posted unkind comments and the parents of the 'victim'.*

We are particularly concerned with the misuse of platforms such as 'Tiktok' and 'Snapchat' where we have had some very unkind content posted among peers. These are even more dangerous as they disappear when posted or can be easily deleted. We would urge you to screen capture or video any messages that your child receives that concern you for evidence. We do talk to the children in school about these incidents and advise parents to contact the police in extreme circumstances as they are classed as malicious communication. It is very difficult for us to monitor communication outside school but inevitably this activity spills into school and has an adverse effect on friendships and behaviour.

The minimum age requirements for most social media platforms is 13 and therefore none of our pupils at Penshurst should be accessing these platforms:

- 13 years Instagram, Facebook, Snapshot
- 16 years Whatsapp
- 18 years YouTube

If you have made a decision to allow your children to access these sites, the NSPCC advises that you monitor their activity closely to avoid any harm coming to them or others. We have had visits from the PCSO and East Riding behaviour team in the last six months to talk to the children about this problem and will continue to work with them to help our pupils understand that their actions online have consequences.

In other news our Y5/6 girls football team played in a tournament on Monday night and did fantastically well winning one match, drawing three and losing one. Well done girls! Not bad for a first ever go! The boys final takes place on the 20 October - good luck boys!

After half term the school choir will resume on a Friday after school -this is open to Y4, 5 and 6 initially and is quite a commitment as we are often asked to sing at events such as the Hessle Light Switch on and at various establishments around Hessle. A Google form will be sent out to sign up and it will be first come, first serve. Please only fill it in if your child is truly interested in singing as we work really hard to get to a high level and dedication and exemplary behaviour is a must in this provision.

For those of you still planning on visiting the Fair - have a great time. Otherwise have a restful weekend.

It has been the first half term in a while when we have not had to send classes home or teach online and I must say it has been refreshing to return to near normality. Classrooms are buzzing with children sitting in groups again, discussing their work and sharing ideas. It has been a pleasure to walk around the school and see children helping each other with their learning as we all know two heads can be better than one!

We are really focusing on times tables next term in every spare minute that we have as this appears to be a real issue in most classes from Year 3 upwards. It is incredibly hard to access any new maths concept if you do not have a sound understanding of times tables. From Year 4, children are expected to know by heart all of the times tables up to 12 x12 and be able to both recite them in order and answer random questions. Therefore we really need your help to embed times tables at home either using Purple Mash, Times Table Rock Stars or by simply chanting them in order.

As you will see above in the date's section, Year 5 are due to start the swimming lessons that they missed in Year 4 due to school closures. As the local swimming pools are struggling to fit in all of the year groups, they have changed the schedule and we will be taking our pupils on a Wednesday and Thursday morning for four weeks which will replace

the PE sessions they have in school. A Google Form for your permission will be sent out during the first week back.

The non-uniform day on Friday 5 November is the day that we ask all of you to bring a piece of chocolate for the Christmas Fair prizes. Teachers will collect the chocolate in their room and Mrs Smith will make them into amazing Christmas arrangements to sell to raise funds.

We have also had contact from the immunisation team who will be coming into school to dispense flu vaccinations to pupils. All arrangements for the vaccinations are done by the immunisations team and we will send you their link following this blog for you to give permission if you wish your child to receive the vaccination. We do not keep any lists at all in school as they collate the information centrally and tell us on the day which children are to be vaccinated.

After half term, we will let you know the Christmas production dates and details of ticket sales –we begin with FS2 at the end of November in order to fit all year groups in before Christmas. The process will be the same as previously with two tickets allocated to each child and then a general sale if any additional tickets are available.

It has been a brilliant week in school with the first day back 'hooking' the children into their new theme. It was lovely to see so many children dressed up for this. You should now have received details of all the hook dress up days which always fall on the first day back after a holiday. Another dress up occasion went particularly well in the form of the 'Monster Pyjama party' and I hope all the children enjoyed their first school disco.

In addition to the hook day, we have also begun holding assemblies in the hall again and I cannot explain how emotional it was to see the whole school together again after two years although we had also forgotten how much of a squeeze it is to get 500 children in the hall at the same time! The children were remarkably well behaved and I am pleased to say have not

forgotten all of our songs. I was particularly proud of our Year 1 pupils who have never been to the hall for assembly before and they really did sit beautifully and joined in with everything.

Please ensure that your child has their PE kit every day –if you need to take it home during the week, please bring it back in. With the change in weather, PE often has to move around and it is important that children access the PE curriculum. Please remember that your child cannot access PE with earrings in which means they miss it for six weeks - summer holidays is an ideal time to get them booked in. Also, can we please have coats in every day as it so often rains just as lunchtime hits and we do try and at least get the children out for a run around and fresh air.

I have been out and about looking at the impact of the safer streets scheme and on the whole have found it to be positive. The council, the local MP and I have received a couple of complaints from residents on Penshurst Avenue about parents parking across their drives and blocking them from getting out. To be fair this is not a new problem and has rumbled on ever since I became Head in 2012. All I ask is that you show respect for the residents and do not block their driveways. We have always recommended that you park away from the school and walk to the Penshurst entrance to avoid the congestion.

Christmas is a heartbeat away now and we have already started rehearsing for some of our earlier performances and we are all incredibly excited to have this part of school life restored after so long. At Penshurst our curriculum is built upon a love of reading and we have been working really hard this week to ensure that the children understand the importance of reading. As a senior leadership team we have been watching reading lessons, enjoying the 10 minute pledge where teachers read the lead text to the class and talking to the children about their home reading books. On Monday and Friday the children access their lead text for the half term and on Tuesday to Thursday they access our own school scheme with a different text every day. When watching the Tuesday Reading lessons across the school, it was brilliant to see the varied texts that children are exposed to from a biography of Diego Maradona (Y6) to Jessie J song lyrics (Y4) to a beautifully illustrated picture book in Year 3.

In EYFS to year 2 we follow the 'Read Write Inc' scheme which teaches children how to read using their phonic ability. In EYFS and year 1, the books they bring home are matched to their phonic ability and the sounds they are learning in school but we would also like to send home books for you to enjoy reading with them as well. On that subject, if you have a stack of picture books that your child has outgrown we would be very grateful for them. I have reluctantly parted with close to 50 picture books as my children are now in their teens and I feel I no longer have an excuse to keep them!

We are trying to think of new ways to encourage children to read more at home as well and have invested heavily in new shiny books for the library which is certainly enticing the year 6 pupils. We are currently having discussions about whether or not to bring back reading records so we can see what the children are reading at home and reward them for their hard work but we are happy to take on any suggestions about home reading that you might have. The 10 minute pledge was introduced pre COVID and was intended to be a promise between parents and staff to increase the reading we do with the children-the idea being that we read every day for 10 minutes with them and you do the same at home. We hold our part of the 10 minute pledge every day after lunch which is above and beyond the Reading lesson; it is my most favourite part of the day as the entire school just reads for pure enjoyment. Over the next couple of months, we will be seeking your opinions on a number of school activities and provision via Google forms and we have begun this by sending questionnaires to parents of children with additional needs. We are looking to improve communication with parents and check that we are doing everything possible in school to provide the right care for individuals. It has been impossible to have parents into school over the past two years and so we are really starting to focus on rebuilding face to face communication and making sure you are best informed about your child.

Every school is entitled to extra money to help children whose parents access the following criteria:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

It is really important that we know if you access any of the above as we can then receive extra money in school to help your child. This could be in the form of extra staffing or maybe resources. It can also help to fund clubs, trips, the Nurture room and breakfast clubs ensuring we can continue with these provisions.

Please fill in the form we are sending home as soon as you can as it may just be that you do qualify and we can access additional support for your child in school. It is really important that you fill this in even if your child receives universal free school meals as it will still bring extra money into school to use in the classroom. We need your help to access this extra money.

Whatever happens we will still go ahead with a performance in school that may be able to be recorded for parents to view. I will let you know as soon as we make that decision. Please bear with us as the situation changes daily and most local schools have cancelled all festive activities now.

We recently sent out a survey regarding support for children with additional needs and this has been invaluable in helping us adjust some of our communication strategies already. It does seem that online forms are the way forward for us to collect information and so we will continue to use this method to collect parent voice as it is quick and efficient and does not take too much of your time to complete. Thank you again for participating in such high numbers.

Unfortunately we do have a few cases of nits in some of our year groups so please be vigilant and I would suggest long hair is tied back.

With an escalation of COVID cases in local schools it would be prudent to take a LFD if your child is unwell and, if showing covid symptoms, book a PCR test. The cases are manageable at the moment but other schools are not faring well and have had to make a return to remote learning. We will continue to send children home who present with symptoms in school so you can take them for a PCR test but please be vigilant at home as well.

I would firstly like to thank you for the messages of support we have received regarding cancelling the school fair and maintaining the productions. It is always difficult to manage these situations especially when all around are cancelling. Any perishable goods that have been donated (such as chocolate) have been put into the year group hampers, raffles or sweet drives. We also donated advent calendars and other goods to the Bridgewater Factory appeal therefore ensuing our local community benefits from your donations.

We are nearly at the end of term and there are still a number of events still to take place in what will be a busy week.

Firstly, on Tuesday, we will be holding our Open Event in the nursery. This has been well promoted in the area but, if you have not seen the information that has been sent out, it can be found <u>here</u>. Please also pass on the message to anyone in your family or community who you think this may be appropriate for.

We then have just two Christmas productions left to do. FS1's nativity will go ahead as planned as we have very low numbers attending as it is a small year group. We feel completely safe with the extra measures such as reduced numbers and wearing of masks that we have in school.

As it stands, we are still planning to go ahead with the Year 4/5/6 production on Tuesday afternoon at the Church as it is a big space which is well ventilated (one might even say freezing cold!). However, after doing the pre visit with the children, it became apparent that we must put further measures in place to safeguard everyone particularly as there is a social distancing measure currently in place at the Church which would not accommodate the normal numbers. Below is a list of the additional measures we are putting in place to ensure the production goes ahead:

- One adult only per child to attend who will be signed in on the door to reduce numbers
- Masks to be worn at all times
- Parents to sit in Year group sections to encourage distancing
- Children to be walked back to school by staff after the performance to avoid the mixing that normally takes place at the end of the show. Children will not be allowed to leave with their parent.

I am sure many of you will be disappointed that we are reducing numbers but please be aware this is essential in meeting the East Riding criteria to put on a production in COVID times. We are hoping that with these additional measures we are safe to continue and will only cancel if the situation in school changes where we find ourselves with escalating cases or staff absence.

This leads me nicely onto Christmas parties.... These will still go ahead in year groups on the last Friday in the morning and as it is before lunchtime this year, we will only be having a few snacks. We will provide drinks, fruit and some supplementary bits and bobs. We would kindly ask that you send in packaged biscuits, buns, crisps and fruit so we can ensure all children have a snack to enjoy while partying the morning away! If your child has an allergy we will

ensure there are some food bits however you may feel that you wish to plate them up some bits to eat as pre-packaged items very often state that the product may include nuts.

Welcome back and Happy New Year

It has been great to see the children running into school this week and this eagerness can also be seen in their learning in the classroom. Hook Day was superb fun with many children dressing up for the occasion to celebrate their new theme.

Please accept your invitation to Google Classroom again if you have not done so as this is where work is set for children. Teachers will be going through passwords in class with the children but the office does hold copies if you require a password for any of the online sites we use. I genuinely hoped not to have to mention COVID this year but it seems that it may be an issue for a while longer. We do have some absence due to COVID positive cases and so please be vigilant if your child presents with symptoms and continue doing lateral flow tests where possible.

At the moment, the planned trips are still going ahead however, this may be subject to change and if they are cancelled we will update you as soon as possible and postpone them to a future date. You will have now received notification of after school clubs being cancelled and I must say it has been done with a heavy heart as we recognise how important these are to the pupils and parents. However, we must take every step necessary to ensure the safe running of the school over the next few weeks.

This term is generally where we see children fly in their learning as they begin to consolidate the autumn terms learning and build upon it. Parents' Evenings will discuss progress in core subjects and will be held remotely. Please bear in mind that these only last five minutes and if you require a longer conversation about a particular issue, then you will need to arrange a further meeting. For those children who receive additional intervention in school and are on the SEND register, there will be an optional pop in day to book an appointment to discuss your child's individual learning plan. On a final note, can we please ensure that all medication is taken to the school office where a form must be filled in to allow the medicine to be stored and administered. Please do not give medication to other school staff to keep or allow children to have it with them. We only administer medicine that is required 4x a day as any other doses can be given at home.

WEEK 16 - Friday 14 January 2022

This week we have been talking in school about homework and how best to ensure that it meets the needs of our children. It is such a controversial topic at Primary School as parents really are split 50/50 in any survey we send out about the use/amount/type of homework that is given to children. I have yet to meet a sample of parents who all agree on this topic! We seem to fall in line with most of the local schools in focusing on Reading, times tables and spellings as these underpin everything else we need to cover in school.

We have come to the general consensus that little and often is the way forward concentrating on the basics. We currently ask that the children read for 10 minutes every day as part of the School Pledge and after talking to the children we have decided to send out Reading records again to record three of these sessions. Children have told us that they enjoyed being 'Reader of the Week' and getting penguins for reading. This will be in place after half term.

Children in EYFS, Year1 and some of Year 2 bring home books matched to their phonic ability and these match the scheme we use in school: Read Write Inc. These books are incredibly expensive though so please ensure your child is returning the book each week. In KS2, children bring home books that match their reading level and choose their own book from our library.

Alongside the reading homework, we set the online Times Table Rockstars to help the children master this area of maths. In Year 4, pupils are required to take a national multiplication test and this online homework will really help them to achieve good results in this test. All children from Years 2 - 6 now have a Times Tables Rockstars login. Research shows that five minutes of practice every day on the website or app increases their recall speed of times tables and having the ability to recall their times tables from memory improves Maths knowledge. By the end of Year 2, pupils are expected to know their 2s, 5s and 10 times tables. By the end of Year 3, pupils are expected to know their 3s, 4s and 8s, and by the end of Year 4, pupils are expected to know all times tables up to 12 x 12.Challenges have been set by your child's teacher so please log on and practise as and when you can!

Finally, there are spellings to do! We have slightly altered the spellings as we will now be sending out the 'Penshurst 30' spelling list. These must be achieved in order to move back onto the more difficult spelling sets on Purple Mash. The reasoning behind this is that these words are the most incorrectly spelt throughout every year group and it is so important that we fix this issue. Year 1 will continue to have spellings that match their phonic learning.

I know what many of you will be thinking... How on earth do people fit this all in? As a busy working mum of two I completely understand the juggling act. Remember most children from Year 3 up can manage this on their own so it is mainly our youngest learners who need the support the most. I certainly don't have all the answers but I used to use car trips to their dance and sporting clubs to go through spellings or listen to them read while I cooked dinner. I suppose it is about finding that 5-10 minutes where you can and sometimes multi-tasking has to be the answer.

Our main priority is that whatever the pupils are set for homework makes a difference to their learning in school. If you are having any difficulties with completing or accessing the homework, please talk to your class teacher or any of our subject leaders in school.

This can be particularly tricky for our younger learners who thrive on consistency and familiarity, however all classes affected have been brilliant and carried on with their learning while maintaining a positive attitude and behaving fantastically.

Many of the supply teachers have been quick to tell me how lovely our school and its pupils are, and I couldn't agree more. I would also include staff for a round of applause as current absence is challenging and creates a lot of extra workload for those who are still in school. We have taken the step to return to class bubbles in Year 5 for a week due to a rising number of cases and will review this next Friday. Unfortunately we have had to close Year 1 for a day as well for a deep clean following a sharp incline in both pupil and staff cases in this year group. Please continue to test your child regularly. This week a little boy in Year 1 stopped me in the corridor and said, 'Mrs Spencer, we are all really bored of the virus now so could you please make it go away so we can sing again together '. I only wish I had the power! Seeing all the children together in the hall is one of the best bits of the job as we really are such a big family at Penshurst and all the staff miss this aspect of the school day. The same boy then proceeded to sing the Penshurst song to me, complete with actions and the school value rap to prove he could still remember it!

If you ever struggle to remember the school values, just ask your child to sing the Penshurst song as they are all in there! I have certainly appreciated the 'resilience ' of everyone in school this week.

WEEK 18 - Friday 28 January 2022

I am going to keep COVID news to a paragraph! We are still managing to keep all year groups open despite ongoing staff absence and we will continue to maintain this for as long as possible. The highest rates in our community are the 5 - 16 year olds so it is not a surprise that primary schools are being hit really hard at the moment across the region. On

this note a big 'thank you' to some of our nursery parents who helped by keeping their children off school on Thursday when staffing was a concern - this really did help.

This leads me nicely onto the Safer Streets initiative. The scheme is council led and during the first term we supported them by having staff out on the streets to inform parents and residents of the new rules and the signage that has been put up. We have had to drastically scale down staff visits to this area due to ongoing absence however it was never the intention that school staff continue to man these streets and we have started to pull back our visits since Christmas anyway to this area; my priority is that staff are in school educating the children. The council always advised us to support the scheme heavily at the outset and then scale back to spot checks which we will still accommodate.

I will just remind everyone that the council has put this scheme in place to keep children safe around our school so please abide by the rules. It is sad to hear that some members of our community are taking advantage of the streets not being staffed every day to park and drive down the streets; I thank the vast majority of parents who continue to follow the rules and make the streets safer for those walking to school.

We have had an issue reported to us about the behaviour of children queuing at the Penshurst Avenue entrance resulting in a couple of younger children being hit by footballs etc. Please can I ask that children queue sensibly while waiting for the gates to open and are respectful of younger pupils and parents. Remember registration is not until 8.50am so there is 10 minutes to stagger yourself into school and no need to be queuing at 8.40am although I appreciate those heading off to work may want to be in quickly.

This week a couple of parents have asked me my thoughts on whether I support the teaching of phonics in school as there is a big splash in the press at the moment about phonics not being the best way to teach reading. I can honestly say that we have found phonics teaching to be a very successful way of introducing children to reading and our outcomes in Reading at every stage are well above national. We follow the Read Write Inc scheme which children generally complete by Year 2 at which point they begin whole class text comprehension. The Pledge that we complete every day introduces children to comprehension from FS2 upwards so this compliments the phonics scheme that we follow.

What I would add is that, like in any subject, not all children learn the same way and some pupils will learn to read via recognising whole words rather than breaking them down. My own two children were very different in their approach to reading with one learning phonetically and the other learning via sight words and both of them became secure and fluent readers. We do appreciate different learning styles and ensure that teaching of reading (although following a synthetic phonics scheme) does allow for other pathways for these children if required. I would also say that whichever scheme you follow, it is the quality of the teacher that counts and in that I am very lucky to have extremely skilled teachers who are passionate about teaching children to read.

This week we have held our first sports fixture of the year as our Year 6 boys have taken on Hymers at football! ***Hot off the press...4-0 to Penshurst*** Well done boys! The only change we are making to these sports fixtures is to have them in single year group teams instead of the usual mix we would have. We are also hopeful that the trip to York with Year 3 will go ahead on Monday and I know they will have an amazing time there.

This week Year 3 managed to complete our first school trip of the year and all children enjoyed the visit. Despite a couple of travel sickness incidents, it all ran really smoothly and the children were a credit to the school. More events to follow this term include Red Nose Day where we invite everyone to wear red and make a donation if you wish. Additionally, we are planning to hold the Friendship Disco after half term if Covid cases in school continue to decline.

After half term we will open clubs again and these will be the same as before Christmas so your child can just re-join their original sessions. At Easter we are going to have a revamp of clubs and we will send out new booking forms for the summer term just before the Easter holiday. This will allow different clubs to take place giving children and staff a change and hopefully allowing those who did not get a place in the autumn term to participate.

I have just sent a letter to the Year 5 children stating that school will be adding on an extra hour at the end of each day - this is for their persuasive writing lesson so please don't be alarmed (or thrilled) if your child mentions this. We would appreciate it if you would play along for a while, or plead ignorance, so we can really start some good debates in class. When the teachers shared the news about this happening in Wales the children were horrified so it will be interesting to read their persuasive letters they send back to me!

Final reminder, can children please bring in water bottles and book bags as we are struggling to send books etc. home and with water fountains limited due to Covid risk assessments, we really need children to have access to their own water bottle all day. This is a particular problem in Year 1.

WEEK 20 - Friday 11 February 2022

This week I would like to focus on the healthy schools agenda. We are incredibly proud that we have the healthy schools accreditation which looks closely at how we map our curriculum to encourage both healthy minds and bodies. All of the work that Mrs Smith does with bike ability and road safety also contribute to maintaining a healthy school. We have taken steps to ensure that we are sending any birthday sweets/cakes that are bought in to you to make a decision around your own child's diet and whenever we have food tasting in school, we aim to have healthy alternatives where possible and appropriate. We also provide fruit every day for children in EYFS and KS1 to help towards the 'five a day' agenda.

In the last few weeks however we have become concerned over the packed lunches and we have a duty as a school to address this. I must remind you that carbonated drinks, sweets and whole family bars of chocolate are not allowed in school (this includes items such as Winders which have as much sugar as a Mars bar and are classed as sweets). A healthy lunch really does help children learn better in the afternoon.

The school's 'Food in the Academy' policy states the following regarding lunch boxes from home:

the school request that parents do not include the following items in packed lunches:

- sweets, chocolate etc.
- fizzy/sugary drinks
- sweet cakes e.g. sugary cakes, doughnuts
- Sweet nut bars
- Foods containing salted nuts
- Packets of salted nuts

As we continue to evaluate our curriculum, we are reviewing all of the elements required in our relationships, sex education and health lessons. In July 2020, I sent you a brief parent overview of the changes being made to the content and delivery of this subject. In all

honesty, it has not really changed what we teach in schools as we were already covering all of the topics. I am just re-sending you the government document again to remind you of our obligations. Please click here for the RSE Guide for Parents.

In primary school, as part of Relationships Education, all pupils will have been taught content on:

- Families and people who care for me
- Caring friendships
- Respectful relationships
- Online relationships
- Being safe

In addition, under Health education, they will have knowledge of:

- Mental wellbeing
- Internet safety and harms
- Physical health and fitness
- Healthy eating
- Health and prevention
- Basic first aid
- Changing adolescent body

As a parent you cannot withdraw your child from Relationships Education, however you can remove them from Sex Education. To do so, you would need to fill in a removal form, clearly stating the reasons why, for the Head of School to authorise. At Penshurst, we collaborate with the school nurse to hold sessions in Year 6 around puberty and where babies come from. We have never had any issues from these sessions and to my knowledge we have never had anyone not take part. If you wish to talk further about RSE, please do not hesitate to contact Mrs Preston who is in charge of all things curriculum.

Another item that falls under the healthy school agenda is e safety. We have had a number of issues on social media outside school in the last few weeks involving mainly Year 5 and 6 children. This continues to be a real problem and I ask that you check your children's phones and reiterate to them the importance of being kind. We have had the PCSO and the Anti-Social Behaviour Lead into school again this week to reinforce how dangerous cyber bullying is and the impact it can have on individuals and families. The children involved in these sessions were a credit to the school and I hope are beginning to have a better understanding of their responsibility when on social media forums.

This term we have been looking very closely at the provision in school for children with additional needs be they emotional, behavioural or academic. It has been a turbulent term with so much child and staff absence due to COVID isolations and so this has been even harder than normal to accommodate every child's need. I sincerely hope that next half term brings us less disruption.

We recently sent parents of children with additional needs a questionnaire regarding provision in school and parents were absolute in their belief in the teaching and support their child receives. An area of development for us was to ensure that the learning support plans are now regularly shared with parents so they can contribute as parents quite rightly stated that they have not had the opportunity in COVID times to come in and talk about these. We will be holding remote meetings on the dates above to allow parents to discuss their child's plan and to have a better understanding of where their child sits in the SEN process and the interventions and adaptations that take place in school. This will also be reinforced in our Parents Evenings that take place in late March.

We have made the decision to continue with remote meetings for the time being but will be hosting opportunities for parents to pop into school to look at their child's work after Easter.

We have tried to make World Book Day as cost effective as possible by allowing children to come dressed as a word. This could be pyjamas for 'sleepy', attaching balloons for 'celebration' or wearing red for 'angry'. The choice is yours. We hope this will encourage all kinds of vocabulary discussion on the day. If you can, we would also appreciate it if you could provide your child with a large potato for a craft activity we are doing in the afternoon with the whole school - we will have plenty extra in school should anyone forget. The day will be filled with reading activities to further inspire that love of reading. Remember that after half term, we will be returning to sending home reading records for children to log their 3 x weekly reading.

Continuing the Reading theme, we would very much like to encourage any parents who have a love of reading to help us on a Friday afternoon. We would like to reintroduce 'Reading buddies'. Staff will host the afternoons and we would like parents to come into the hall and read with children who need a little extra encouragement. The children adore having new visitors in and would really benefit from extra opportunities to read to adults. If you have a couple of hours to spare, please contact the office. I will provide biscuits (or fruit as a healthy alternative!) Thank you to those parents who have begun to offer their time to speak to our EYFS about their jobs. We are collating a list and will get back to you all individually about suitable timings. The more the merrier please so keep sending those emails in.

6:1 to Penshurst... the score following the Year 5 and 6 match against Christopher Pickering. It appears that our boys football teams are going from strength to strength so a big thank you to Mr Hutchinson for organising training, dates of matches and escorting them everywhere.

It has been a pleasure to watch nearly every class in their learning this week and I have really been struck with the resilience that pupils are demonstrating. Not only are they settling back into full time learning but they are simultaneously filling any gaps brought about by the disruption to education over the past two years while tackling new and tricky concepts. There is a real buzz in the classrooms as children celebrate getting answers correct. I have seen fantastic Maths lessons where children have grappled with converting fractions into decimals and exchanging in column subtraction; inspiring Reading lessons with songs, poems, stories and biographies all being explored and enjoyed through to fascinating Science lessons where children can confidently place scientists on a timeline and evaluate how impactful their inventions were.

We have been concentrating really hard in our thematic afternoons in ensuring that children can link previous knowledge to new learning and I have seen some really good examples of this happening around the building for example with Year 5 able to compare Newton to other

scientists and compare scientific theories. The knowledge organisers that we use in class are on the website so maybe challenge the children to tell you some facts from their previous themes to see what they have remembered. It is so important that children learn to link ideas and build their knowledge base. Year 2 are getting really good at comparing authors and discussing similarities and differences in their writing.

Community has been the topic of staff meetings in school recently as it is only these last two weeks where we have been able to mix again in school as a staff body and we have really missed face to face staff meetings and being able to collaborate with each other on a daily basis. This has obviously also been a barrier to our pupils mixing and to us being able to invite parents into school for challenge days, stay and play sessions, plays, assemblies and so forth. We are, I'm afraid, seeing an increase in Covid cases again which was to be expected with the relaxation of rules across the country. This means that we will continue to limit visitors into school until at least Easter and work with Public Health to do what we can to minimise the risks of transmission. Hopefully, we will then be in a position to put back on all of our lovely events that we invite you into school for. We are dipping our toes in the water slightly to put on P Factor but will again limit numbers in the hall, implement a one way system and encourage hand sanitisation on entrance to school.

The sun has just appeared as I finish writing so I am hopeful for a sunny, bright weekend - enjoy.

Communication between school and home is always an area we are looking to improve on especially as we all live such busy lives and tend to live in a digital world now instead of one where letters are sent out. Texts, emails, Twitter and the Headteachers blog are currently our main forms of communication within our school community and we would like this to remain the case to promote consistency of where to go to find out information about what is happening in school. We are also in the process of updating the website to showcase all that we do in school and our intention for teaching and learning in school.

We are really ramping up our use of our Twitter site in school to showcase events in school and celebrate day to day life at Penshurst. Please take the time to follow us - by App or PC -

Another week, another football match. Well done to the Year 6 boys who played a cracking match against Anlaby Primary School on Tuesday night resulting in a 1:1 draw. The boys narrowly missed out on several more goals and really did show what a good team they are. We have many more matches coming up including our Girls football team so I will keep you updated with their achievements.

As we resume normal service at school, following what has been an incredibly different couple of years in education, it is time to take stock and evaluate where we are as a school. We recently conducted a pupil survey with all children and their response was overwhelmingly positive:

- 99% feel safe in school
- 98% feel they have someone to talk to
- 97% enjoy school
- 95% believe they are challenged in their learning.
- 97% believe that any bullying or unkindness is rare and is dealt with quickly by staff

This is really positive and we are busy chasing up any worries individuals have around feeling safe or enjoying school. While I am thrilled that the pupils feel so positively about school, I would also like to take the opportunity to gauge parent views so we can address any issues that you may have. The questionnaire can be found <u>here</u>. We aim to do this questionnaire twice a year. If you disagree with any statements could you please offer a little more information to explain why you have ticked this box so we can address any concerns.

I think we have all struggled with not having visitors to school and having to do everything remotely (although many of you have commented that you prefer remote parent evenings as it fits in with your busy lives). I have added an extra question to the standard questionnaire asking your view on parents evening so we can make decisions on how we run these events in the future. In May, we are going to host a short event after school where we will bring tables out to the playground in KS2 and outside KS1/EYFS classrooms and lay out the childrens books for you to have a look at. All staff will be present to look through books with you and answer any questions - this may fill the gap that the remote meetings don't fill and give you an even better insight into the progress your child is making. Thank you to all those who attended the Parents Evening. We will chase up those of you who did not make appointments to ensure there are no concerns or issues moving forwards.

I continue to advocate reading every night with your child to ensure they accelerate the learning that happens in school. It is lovely to see that the majority of children are bringing in their reading records to celebrate home reading. In Year 4, please work with your children on their times tables as they will sit the national multiplication test in June. They need to know all of their times tables up to 12 x 12 and be able to recall them at speed (within six seconds). Please encourage your child to work on TTRockstars as often as they can and challenge themselves to get better and better.

On a final e safety note, we have had some concerns reported to us around a TiK Tok character called Huggy Wuggy that our very youngest children seem to know about. Huggy Wuggy sounds like a cuddly teddy bear. But the monster is actually an evil villain in the 2021 horror PC game Poppy Playtime by MOB Games. The blue stuffed bear is no Care Bear. When he opens his mouth, he has rows of sharp teeth. And that's just the tip of the iceberg. He hunts people down and says things like, "I could hug you forever until you breathe your

last breath." The problem is that this character can pass through fire walls as it appears to be a child-friendly character. Please as always be careful around the sites your child is accessing and the content they are exposed to.

The weather has certainly made a real difference at school playtimes this week and we may have the grand re-opening of the field next week. Enjoy what looks to be a sunny weekend.

Thank you so much for filling out the questionnaire we sent out this week in your droves. Again, I am thrilled that so many of you are so happy with Penshurst and your child's experience at our school.

The key headlines so far:

- 98% my child is happy
- 99% my child feels safe
- 97% bullying is rare and school deal effectively with any cases
- 99% the school makes sure its pupils are well behaved
- 97% would recommend the school to others
- 98% my child does well
- 98% the school supports my child's personal development

These figures match those of the children themselves and it is so pleasing to know that the vast majority of our community love this school as much as myself and the staff do. Senior leaders and members of the welfare team will contact parents where there has been any 'disagree' or 'strongly disagree' statements over the coming weeks to understand this further. I did add a sneaky extra question this time to gauge how parents would like information evenings in the future as we can now open our doors again following two years of strict sanctions. An overwhelming 70% of parents would like a return to face to face meetings and so it remains a challenge for us to see if we can maybe do a hybrid of both remote and 'in person' meetings in the next round to suit all.

It is shaping up to be a very busy last week with the last few assessments, P Factor performances, football matches and class photos. We also have videographers in on Thursday to take some footage of daily life in the Early Year Foundation Stage which the children absolutely love taking part in - it is like being a tv star for the day! We will of course only video pupils with external publicity permission. The video will be on our website for

prospective parents to watch and gain a better understanding of what the EYFS daily timetable looks like. The children adore filming, it is the adults that struggle more!

More football matches next week with Year 6 boys on Monday and Year 5 /6 girls on Thursday. Both matches are at Penshurst. We have unfortunately had some unsportsmanship behaviour from some team members and, as in the real world of football, this has resulted in some match bans for some. We expect the highest standards from our pupils when they are in public representing our school and for the first time ever we have fallen short of expectations on two occasions. We will monitor this closely and continue to educate our young sports people on the importance of professional conduct; however, I would ask that if you are a parent on the sidelines, you also support us by ensuring a sportsmanlike attitude as well. Please be careful of your language while on any of the school site and remember it is supposed to be fun - I keep reminding the year 6 boys of this as at times I am sure they think they have lost the World Cup.

As I write this blog, the sun has appeared, Y1 are playing on the field, EYFS are conducting a bug hunt, there is a poetry lesson in Evie's garden and there is a football tournament about to commence. School is so much more than Reading, Writing and Maths and we work just as hard at planning enrichment activities as we do at planning core learning.

We also ensure our morning circles and assemblies focus on enrichment and personal development with children learning about British Values, religions, cultures and world views. We hope this better prepares pupils for the world we live in and allow them to become rounded citizens. It is also about celebrating differences and the unique characters of all pupils.

This morning the whole school has been learning about Eid and it was fantastic to hear the questions being asked in classes and the respect being shown towards different religions and beliefs. We live in a multicultural country and it is imperative that pupils recognise and celebrate this. We have a number of different religions in our school and it has been really nice to see pupils informing others of their beliefs and how they live their lives.

Next week Year 6 sit their SAT's which have not taken place for two years due to the pandemic; they are all understandably nervous however we really try to make the week as stress free as possible surrounding the tests with fun activities which culminates in a dress down day for the year group on the Friday. For those of you who have yet to experience SAT's with your child, there really is no need to panic! It is a set of five tests which the children have sat mock tests for ever since Year 5. It is no different to the end of term tests that we do as standard in school.

What they do help with is ensuring pupils are placed appropriately at high school however they will also have cognitive tests during transition week at Hessle and in addition teacher assessments and judgements are put forward. This raft of other evidence ensures that if a pupil has an 'off day' during SAT's it is not by any means the end of the world!

We have already started work on transition to Year 7 with parent information evenings for the parents of pupils with SEN, visits from Mrs Pinkney, Transition Coordinator at Hessle High) and the secondary ready curriculum in full swing. Year 5 also start high school preparation by taking part in a series of secondary online lessons.

We are looking at staffing for all year groups next year and will begin to advertise our new starters meetings for EYFS children and our 'transition to Year 1 'meeting. Official transition for all year groups will take place in the last week of term when all pupils will 'move up' a year group and meet their new teacher for three days before spending the last two days of term back in their current year group. 'Meet the teacher' sessions will take place on these mornings before school to allow you to ask any questions or pass any information to new teachers.

We are also planning Sports days, Jubilee celebrations, whole school football tournaments, school trips and visits and the Summer Fair - a busy busy term ahead!

Firstly, a big thank you to everyone who emailed us wishing the Year 6 pupils and team well in the SATs week. We have had a number of visitors checking that we are administering the exams as they should be and all ran very smoothly-a particular thanks to Governors who attended to check procedures. The Year 6 pupils really were incredibly well disciplined. It gives us pleasure to see even those who really struggle give it their best shot. This leads us nicely into next week where the residential takes place allowing them to blow off some steam and face challenges in a different way - I'm sure they will really show off their competitive natures.

We now have Year 2 SATs to administer, which again we will keep very low key for the pupils and after half term we have the Year 1 phonics and the Year 4 multiplication checks followed by the EYFS GLD data entry to the local authority. It has been a couple of years without all of the testing and I know there have been questions surrounding the reason for testing and whether we are any better off for doing these exams. What I would say is that pupils will have a lifetime of exams to prepare for and so it really does get them used to life beyond primary; it also allows pupils to show off what they know and get the recognition for this hard work.

We try really hard to keep the exam stress to a minimum and the children are completely used to sitting formal tests on a half term/termly basis anyway.

Do I think children would learn without testing? Yes.

Do I think testing does children any harm? No.

This term is always a busy one with sports days, trips, Jubilee celebrations, reports, transition events etc. so please keep an eye on the dates below. If there are any last minute changes due to weather conditions, we will of course send out texts. In my experience it is usually the wettest week in the year when we hold Sports Days!

In the event of poor weather we try to utilise classrooms and halls where we can. The picnic finishes at 1.30pm and school officially closes at 2pm - you are of course free to take your child home with you after the picnic should you choose to do so and staff will sign you out.

For those of you who have not attended a Summer picnic before, we ask families to bring picnics onto the KS2 field and the children are sat in classes waiting to be picked up by yourselves to have your family picnic. If any child does not have a parent attending, they stay with the class staff to enjoy the picnic together.

It is incredible to think about what staff and pupils managed to squeeze into the last five week half term! The main priority was ensuring Year 6 SATs were completed and that all pupils were happy and comfortable with the experience. We have always strived to ensure that the week is as fun as possible with arts and sporting activities galore surrounding the exams culminating in a 'chillout' day on the Friday.

We were fortunate to have visitors from the Governing Board, other schools and the Trust to help invigilate some of the tests checking that the process was rigorous and all procedures were followed to the letter. There was a lot of talk about the reading test nationally and how difficult the exam was. As a staff body, we felt it was a fair test and the pupils appeared to be answering the questions well so hopefully we will see the high results we have predicted. The Maths papers were tough but again pupils seemed fairly confident that they had done as well as they could and we did not have any tears this year.

We have also completed Year 2 SATs in this half term which we keep as low key as we can these will be optional from 2023. Although we still have a moderation process to complete, early results place us in line with national 2019 results which would be an amazing effort from this year group in what has been another turbulent year of COVID absence for both pupils and staff.

We now just have the multiplication and Y1 phonics tests to conduct in the final half term alongside our normal internal assessment schedule Transition will take place on the penultimate week of term on the Mon/Tues/Wed. At this point the Year 6 pupils will go to Hessle High and the rest of the pupils will 'move up' to their new class and teacher for three days. There will be more news to follow on this in a couple of weeks.

What a lovely week it has been! I cannot believe the fantastic weather we have had for Sports Days and I would like to thank you all for turning out in your droves to support the children. I've got to admit that the Nursery (FS1) event is possibly the highlight of the year for me - unbelievably cute! A special shout out to our House Captains needs to be made as they did a sterling job of running events and supporting the younger children; I could not be more proud of these Year 6 pupils and the high school are so lucky to have them from September. Many of you have emailed in to say how brilliant the older pupils were in encouraging and helping the younger ones and I have passed your comments on to the Year 6 teachers to let them know.

I am sorry but I do need to have a little bit of a rant this week.....

Over the past week, we have seen a huge increase in unkind behaviours outside of school on social media. The majority of the incidents have taken place in Years 4/5/6 and mostly on Whatsapp. Can I remind you that the age of consent for this app is now 16+ and therefore none of our pupils should be using this platform. Unfortunately we are finding that most of our pupils are in groups on this app and while I appreciate it is your parental decision to allow this, we are spending hours and hours in the school week dealing with fallings out, unkind comments and at times borderline bullying that are all happening outside school hours on this media platform.

Whilst I appreciate that we have to get involved with these incidents, I feel that I need to ask for your support. If you intend for your child to have access to these groups despite the age rating, please could you frequently check your child's messages and the groups they are part of. Inevitably, incidents outside school affect behaviours in school and the impact in school is time spent out of class dealing with these behaviours for both staff and pupils.

We will of course continue to investigate incidents brought to our attention and actions can be: circles, parental meetings, sanctions given, repeated online safety education or reports made to police. We speak to our children about online safety and cyberbullying on a weekly basis through assemblies, IT lessons, morning circles and dedicated online learning circles. All I ask is that you continue to support us by checking your child's phone, reporting any unkind behaviours and talking to your child about what they post on a forum. Rant over!

Over the next four weeks, the pace does not slacken in school as having completed assessments, we now begin to fill in any gaps that these tests have highlighted.
