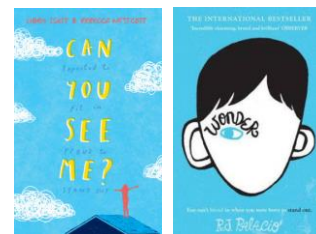


## Secondary Ready

Geographical issue	A problem relating to something to do with geography.
Sustainability	The avoidance of the depletion of natural resources in order to maintain an ecological balance.

Autism	Autism is a lifelong developmental disability which affects how people communicate and interact with the world.
Antoni Gaudí	Famous architect whose work includes the Sagrada Familia in Barcelona.
Norman Foster	Famous architect whose work includes The Gherkin, London City, Millennium Bridge & Wembley Stadium.
Sir Terry Farrell	Famous architect who designed The Deep.
Joseph Hirst	Hull's first architect.
Disability	A physical or mental condition that limits a person's movements, senses, or activities.
Identity	The characteristics determine who or what a person or thing is.
Conformity	Following agreed standards, rules, or laws.
Rebellion	An armed fight against one's government; uprising.
Acceptance	General agreement that something is satisfactory or right or that someone should be included in a group.
Mutual Respect	Two or more people sharing the belief that someone or something is good, valuable or important.
Diversity	To show a variety of something.
Equality	Showing that a person or thing is equal to another.
Tolerance	A willingness to accept other people's behaviour and opinions, even if you do not agree with them.
Tax	A contribution of money you have to make to the country, imposed by the government.
Interest	Money paid regularly at a particular rate for the use of money lent or for delaying the repayment of a debt.
Loan	A sum of money borrowed that is expected to be paid back with interest.
Debt	A sum of money that is owed or due.
Marketing	The advertising, shipping, storing, and selling involved in the transfer of goods from the producer or seller to the consumer or buyer.
Critical Consumer	A person who takes responsibility for the environment, social and political effects of their choices.
Entrepreneur	A person who organises and manages any enterprise, especially a business, usually with considerable initiative and risk.
Economic	Relating to the production, distribution, and use of income, wealth, and commodities.
Budgeting	An estimate, often itemised, of expected income and expense for a given period in the future.
Advertising	The act or practice of calling public attention to a product, service or need.

Income	Revenue (usually money) received for goods or services.
Expense	Cost or charge.
Emotional abuse	Behaviour that causes psychological trauma or stress.
Physical abuse	Behaviour that causes physical trauma or stress.
Sexual abuse	The act of making someone take part in sexual activities, against their wishes, or without their agreement.
Neglect	To fail to care for properly.
