Head of Year 7 Updates

Responsibility in Action: Preparing for Year 8

As the term draws to a close, we've been reflecting on the growth our Year 7 students have shown throughout their first year at Hessle High School. The transition into secondary school is a significant step, and our students have shown great resilience and adaptability in rising to the challenges it brings.

At our school, *Responsibility* is one of our core values and it plays a key role in shaping the kind of learning environment we strive to maintain. As students prepare to enter Year 8, we continue to emphasise that responsibility is more than completing homework or following school rules (though those are obviously important too). It's about making wise choices, respecting others, and understanding the impact of one's actions — both in and out of the classroom.



One area where this value becomes especially important is in how students manage their social interactions. As friendships evolve and peer groups shift, it can be tempting for students to get involved in disagreements or issues that don't directly concern them. While many do so with the intention of helping a friend or feeling included, we encourage students to think carefully about when it's appropriate to step in — and when it's more responsible to step back.

Being responsible in social settings might look like:

- Choosing not to spread or pass on gossip
- · Walking away from drama or conflict that doesn't involve them
- · Encouraging friends to resolve issues calmly or seek support from a trusted adult
- Focusing on their own behaviour, learning, and wellbeing
- Owning up to mistakes and making things right when needed

These behaviours help foster a safe, respectful, and positive environment for everyone. We ask for your support at home in reinforcing these ideas. Talk with your child about the importance of setting boundaries, avoiding unnecessary involvement in others' disputes, and using empathy and good judgment in social situations. Let them know that being a good friend doesn't always mean choosing sides — sometimes it means staying neutral, being supportive from a distance, or encouraging others to do the right thing. As students move into Year 8, they are expected to show greater maturity and independence. Demonstrating responsibility in the classroom, in the playground, and online is a key part of this next stage. Our staff will continue to guide and support them, and we value the strong partnership we have with our families in upholding the values we all share.

Together, we can help our students grow into capable, thoughtful, and responsible young people, ready to thrive in Year 8 and beyond.

Congratulations to all – we look forward to hearing more about your successes in the future.



- Seek help early before your concerns become serious



Science – Year 7

This half term we invited science teachers to nominate those Year 7 students who have really excelled in their science lessons. The lucky students got to enjoy a trip to the National Space Centre.

The Year 7 students are leaving behind their 'sound and the universe' topics and moving onto separation techniques and earth chemistry. In these topics they will learn about the differences between elements, compounds and mixtures, along with how to separate different mixtures using varying techniques. Earth chemistry is exactly what it sounds like, learning about rocks and the atmosphere and naturally occurring reactions. This is then linked into how humans are impacting the earth.

explore how to use hand tools, measure and mark accurately.

Each desk tidy is unique, and students have worked hard to produce neat, well-finished pieces they can proudly use at home.



Textiles lessons have been full of colour, stitching, and imagination! Students have been designing and making monster keyrings using felt, thread, and embellishments. This project has helped students build basic sewing skills and explore design for fun and function.

In coding lessons, students have been introduced to **Scratch**, a visual programming language designed to help young learners understand fundamental programming concepts. They have created several programs including quizzes, animations and games, gaining experience with sequences, loops, conditions, and variables. These projects encouraged creativity while building a foundation in computational thinking.

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


History – Year 7

This term, Year 7 students have been learning about key aspects of life in Medieval England, exploring how people lived, worked, and worshipped during this period. They examined topics such as the feudal system, medieval villages and towns, the role of the Church, and the daily lives of peasants and nobles.

Through this study, students continued to develop their historical skills including essay writing, source analysis, and interpreting evidence.

Students have also been learning about the Crusades this half term, focusing on the causes, key events, and consequences of these religious wars.

They have explored why people went on crusade, who the main figures involved were, and how the Crusades impacted both Europe and the Middle East.


Music – Year 7



Drama & Dance - Year 7



Scarlett's confidence is growing due to her attitude to learning and she helps others in her group.




